EASI Risk Assessment

This Risk Assessment covers individual litter picking (rather than group activities) by EASI volunteers. It should be noted that EASI litter pickers are working entirely at their own risk.

The aim of the risk assessment is to identify the likely risks associated with litter picking for EASI, to score their impact and likelihood of their occurrence, and then to identify countermeasures to reduce the risk. The following explains the scoring used in this risk assessment:

- Impact is a measure from 1 to 5 of how serious a risk is likely to be.
- Likelihood is a measure from 1 to 5 of how likely it is that the risk will occur.

The description associated with each score is given in Appendix A.

The two scores have been multiplied together to give a total score of between 1 and 25 with a higher number indicating a greater risk. The impact and likelihood scores are independent so there can be a risk that has a large impact but a low likelihood (a meteorite hits the picker) or equally a high likelihood but low impact (tree pollen whilst out picking makes a hay fever sufferer sneeze).

For each countermeasure identified, a revised score has been calculated which, if the countermeasure is effective, should be lower than the original.

Note

- This risk assessment covers the risks associated with litter picking as an individual (so not group activities such as Earley Town Council's Huge Earley Litter Pick).
- It seeks to address the risks specifically due to litter picking activity rather than just walking the same route.

Appendix A: Explanation of scoring system

Impact	Description	Likelihood	Assumes the volunteer litter picks once per week
1	Minor injury, no pain or discomfort. No medical help required	1	Very rare – less than once a year
2	Temporary injury requiring first aid treatment	2	Less than once a month
3	More significant injury needs to be treated by a pharmacist or medical professional	3	Perhaps once a month but less than every week
4	Hospital visit required	4	Once per week
5	Potential or actual fatality	5	More than once per week

Revised score meaning

1-4: Acceptable – no further action may be needed and maintaining control measures is encouraged

5-9: Adequate – may be considered for further analysis

10-16: Tolerable – must be reviewed in a timely manner to carry out improvements

17-25: Unacceptable – must cease activities until the score can be reduced.
